Re: Notice of Data Event

Dear Sir or Madam:

We represent Integrated Data Services, Inc. (“IDS”) located at 2141 Rosecrans Avenue, Suite 2050, El Segundo, CA 90245, and are writing to notify your office of an incident that may affect the security of certain personal information relating to ninety (90) Maryland residents. By providing this notice, IDS does not waive any rights or defenses regarding the applicability of Maryland law, the applicability of the Maryland data event notification statute, or personal jurisdiction.

Nature of the Data Event

On February 10, 2022, IDS discovered that certain IDS systems became infected with a software virus that prohibited access to some files. Upon discovery, IDS immediately began a thorough investigation, which included working with third-party forensic investigators, to determine the nature and scope of the incident. The investigation determined that there may have been unauthorized access to sensitive IDS information. IDS quickly began a diligent and comprehensive review to identify the impacted individuals, and to locate contact information for each potentially impacted individual. That process was completed on May 18, 2022. The information that could have been subject to unauthorized access includes name, Social Security number, Driver’s License number, financial account information, and passport number.

Notice to Maryland Residents

On or about June 2, 2022, IDS provided written notice of this incident to ninety (90) Maryland residents. Written notice is being provided in substantially the same form as the letter attached here as ***Exhibit A***.

Other Steps Taken and To Be Taken

Upon discovering the event, IDS moved quickly to investigate and respond to the incident, assess the security of IDS systems, and identify potentially affected individuals. Further, IDS notified federal law enforcement regarding the event. IDS is also working to implement additional safeguards and training to its employees. IDS is providing access to credit monitoring services for one (1) year, through Experian, to individuals whose personal information was potentially affected by this incident, at no cost to these individuals.

Additionally, IDS is providing impacted individuals with guidance on how to better protect against identity theft and fraud. IDS is providing individuals with information on how to place a fraud alert and security freeze on one's credit file, the contact details for the national consumer reporting agencies, information on how to obtain a free credit report, a reminder to remain vigilant for incidents of fraud and identity theft by reviewing account statements and monitoring free credit reports, and encouragement to contact the Federal Trade Commission, their state Attorney General, and law enforcement to report attempted or actual identity theft and fraud.

Integrated Data Services, Inc. (“IDS”) writes to inform you of a recent incident that may affect the security of some of your information. We are providing you with information about the event, our response to it, and resources available to you to help protect your information, should you feel it appropriate to do so.

What Happened?

On February 10, 2022, IDS discovered that certain IDS systems became infected with a software virus that prohibited access to some files. Upon discovery, IDS notified law enforcement and began a thorough investigation, which included working with third-party forensic investigators, to determine the full nature and scope of the incident. That investigation determined that there may have been unauthorized access to sensitive IDS information. IDS quickly began a diligent and comprehensive review to identify the impacted individuals, and to locate contact information for each. That process was completed on May 18, 2022. We are notifying you because the investigation determined your information may have been impacted.

What Information Was Involved?

The investigation determined the information impacted by this incident may include your name, date of birth, social security number, passport number, driver’s license number, taxpayer ID, financial account information, personal address, phone number and email address. **At this time, we have no indication that your information was subject to actual or attempted misuse as a result of this incident.**

What Are We Doing?

In addition to the response outlined above, IDS will be offering [Extra2] of complimentary access to credit monitoring and identity protection service through Experian. If you wish to activate the credit monitoring and identity protection services, you may follow the instructions included in the *Steps You Can Take to Help Protect Your Information*. We encourage you to enroll in the offered services, as we are unable to do so on your behalf.

What Can You Do?

We encourage you to remain vigilant against incidents of identity theft and fraud by reviewing your account statements and monitoring your free credit reports for suspicious activity. You may also review the information contained in the attached *Steps You Can Take to Help Protect Your Information* to learn helpful tips on steps you

can take to protect against possible misuse. There you will also find more information on the complimentary credit monitoring and identity protection services we are making available to you. As noted above, while IDS will cover the cost of these services, should you wish to enroll, you will need to complete the activation process as we are unable to do so on your behalf.

Monitor Your Accounts

Under U.S. law, a consumer is entitled to one free credit report annually from each of the three major credit reporting bureaus, Equifax, Experian, and TransUnion. To order your free credit report, visit www.annualcreditreport.com or call, toll-free, 1-877-322-8228. You may also directly contact the three major credit reporting bureaus listed below to request a free copy of your credit report.

Consumers have the right to place an initial or extended “fraud alert” on a credit file at no cost. An initial fraud alert is a one-year alert that is placed on a consumer’s credit file. Upon seeing a fraud alert display on a consumer’s credit file, a business is required to take steps to verify the consumer’s identity before extending new credit. If you are a victim of identity theft, you are entitled to an extended fraud alert, which is a fraud alert lasting seven years. Should you wish to place a fraud alert, please contact any one of the three major credit reporting bureaus listed below.

As an alternative to a fraud alert, consumers have the right to place a “credit freeze” on a credit report, which will prohibit a credit bureau from releasing information in the credit report without the consumer’s express authorization. The credit freeze is designed to prevent credit, loans, and services from being approved in your name without your consent. However, you should be aware that using a credit freeze to take control over who gets access to the personal and financial information in your credit report may delay, interfere with, or prohibit the timely approval of any subsequent request or application you make regarding a new loan, credit, mortgage, or any other account involving the extension of credit. Pursuant to federal law, you cannot be charged to place or lift a credit freeze on your credit report. To request a credit freeze, you will need to provide the following information:

1. Full name (including middle initial as well as Jr., Sr., II, III, etc.);
2. Social Security number;
3. Date of birth;
4. Addresses for the prior two to five years;
5. Proof of current address, such as a current utility bill or telephone bill;
6. A legible photocopy of a government-issued identification card (state driver’s license or ID card, etc.); and
7. A copy of either the police report, investigative report, or complaint to a law enforcement agency concerning identity theft if you are a victim of identity theft.

Additional Information

For New Mexico residents, you have rights pursuant to the Fair Credit Reporting Act, such as the right to be told if information in your credit file has been used against you, the right to know what is in your credit file, the right to ask for your credit score, and the right to dispute incomplete or inaccurate information. Further, pursuant to the Fair Credit Reporting Act, the consumer reporting bureaus must correct or delete inaccurate, incomplete, or unverifiable information; consumer reporting agencies may not report outdated negative information; access to your file is limited; you must give your consent for credit reports to be provided to employers; you may limit “prescreened” offers of credit and insurance you get based on information in your credit report; and you may seek damages from violators. You may have additional rights under the Fair Credit Reporting Act not summarized here. Identity theft victims and active duty military personnel have specific additional rights pursuant to the Fair Credit Reporting Act.
