Re: Notice of Data Security Incident

Dear Attorney General Frosh:

Lewis Brisbois Bisgaard & Smith LLP ("Lewis Brisbois") represents Whitten Law Office LLC ("Whitten"), a law firm based in Indianapolis specializing in transportation and insurance matters, in connection with a recent data security incident described in greater detail below.

1. Nature of the security incident.

On March 22, 2022, Whitten identified suspicious activity associated with one employee email account. Whitten took immediate steps to secure its email environment and promptly launched an investigation. In so doing, Whitten engaged independent digital forensics and incident response experts to determine what happened and to identify any information that may have been accessed or acquired without authorization as a result. On June 7, 2022, Whitten learned that personal information belonging to certain individuals associated therewith may have been impacted in connection with the incident. Whitten then took steps to identify current mailing addresses in order to effectuate notification to potentially impacted individuals.

The information that may have been accessible by the malicious actor(s) responsible for this incident includes name and driver's license number.

2. Number of Maryland residents affected.

Whitten will be notifying one (1) Maryland resident of this incident via first class U.S. mail on July 8, 2022. A sample copy of the notification letter is included with this correspondence.

3. Steps taken relating to the Incident.

As soon as Whitten discovered this incident, Whitten took steps to secure its email environment and launched an investigation to determine what happened and whether personal information had been

accessed or acquired without authorization. Whitten has also implemented additional safeguards to help ensure the security of its email environment and to reduce the risk of a similar incident occurring in the future.

Whitten has established a toll-free call center through IDX, a leader in risk mitigation and response, to answer any questions about the incident and address related concerns. The call center is available at 1-800-939-4170 from 8:00 A.M. to 8:00 P.M. Central Time, Monday through Friday (excluding holidays). In addition, while Whitten is not aware of the misuse of any information as a result of this incident, out of an abundance of caution, Whitten is also providing complimentary identity protection services to notified individuals.

4. Contact information.

I am writing to inform you of a recent data security incident experienced by Whitten Law Office LLC (“Whitten”) that may have affected your personal information. Whitten takes the privacy and security of all personal information within its possession very seriously. Please read this letter carefully as it contains information regarding the incident and steps that you can take to help protect your personal information.

What Happened? On March 22, 2022, Whitten identified suspicious activity associated with one employee email account. In response, Whitten took immediate steps to secure its email environment and promptly launched an investigation. In so doing, Whitten engaged independent digital forensics and incident response experts to determine what happened and to identify any information that may have been accessed or acquired without authorization as a result. On June 7, 2022, Whitten learned that your personal information may have been impacted in connection with the incident which is the reason for this notification. Please note that Whitten has no evidence of the misuse or attempted misuse of any potentially impacted information.

What Information Was Involved? The information potentially impacted in connection with this incident included your name as well as your <<Variable Text 2: Potentially Impacted Data Sets>>.

What Are We Doing? As soon as Whitten discovered this incident, Whitten took the steps described above. In addition, Whitten implemented measures to enhance the security of its email environment in an effort to minimize the risk of a similar incident occurring in the future.

Although Whitten has no evidence of the misuse of any potentially impacted information, Whitten is providing you with information about steps that you can take to help protect your personal information and is offering you complimentary identity protection services through IDX – a data breach and recovery services expert. These services include <<12 / 24 months>> of credit¹ and dark web monitoring, a \$1 million identity fraud loss reimbursement policy, and fully managed identity theft recovery services.

The deadline to enroll in these services is October 8, 2022. With this protection, IDX will help to resolve issues if your identity is compromised.

What You Can Do: You can follow the recommendations on the following page to help protect your personal information. Whitten also encourages you to enroll in the complementary services being offered to you through IDX by using the enrollment code provided above.

¹ To receive credit monitoring services, you must be over the age of 18 and have established credit in the U.S., have a Social Security number in your name, and have a U.S. residential address associated with your credit file.

STEPS YOU CAN TAKE TO HELP PROTECT YOUR INFORMATION

Review Your Account Statements and Notify Law Enforcement of Suspicious Activity: As a precautionary measure, we recommend that you remain vigilant by reviewing your account statements and credit reports closely. If you detect any suspicious activity on an account, you should promptly notify the financial institution or company with which the account is maintained. You also should promptly report any fraudulent activity or any suspected incidence of identity theft to proper law enforcement authorities, your state attorney general, and/or the Federal Trade Commission (FTC).

Copy of Credit Report: You may obtain a free copy of your credit report from each of the three major credit reporting agencies once every 12 months by visiting <http://www.annualcreditreport.com/>, calling toll-free 1-877-322-8228, or by completing an Annual Credit Report Request Form and mailing it to Annual Credit Report Request Service, P.O. Box 105281, Atlanta, GA 30348. You also can contact one of the following three national credit reporting agencies:

Fraud Alert: You may want to consider placing a fraud alert on your credit report. An initial fraud alert is free and will stay on your credit file for at least one year. The alert informs creditors of possible fraudulent activity within your report and requests that the creditor contact you prior to establishing any accounts in your name. To place a fraud alert on your credit report, contact any of the three credit reporting agencies identified above. Additional information is available at <http://www.annualcreditreport.com>.

Security Freeze: You have the right to put a security freeze on your credit file for up to one year at no cost. This will prevent new credit from being opened in your name without the use of a PIN number that is issued to you when you initiate the freeze. A security freeze is designed to prevent potential creditors from accessing your credit report without your consent. As a result, using a security freeze may interfere with or delay your ability to obtain credit. You must separately place a security freeze on your credit file with each credit reporting agency. In order to place a security freeze, you may be required to provide the consumer reporting agency with information that identifies you including your full name, Social Security number, date of birth, current and previous addresses, a copy of your state-issued identification card, and a recent utility bill, bank statement or insurance statement.

Additional Free Resources: You can obtain information from the consumer reporting agencies, the FTC, or from your respective state Attorney General about fraud alerts, security freezes, and steps you can take toward preventing identity theft. You may report suspected identity theft to local law enforcement, including to the FTC or to the Attorney General in your state.
