Re: Notice of Data Security Incident

Dear Attorney General Brown:

This notice is provided by Washington County, Pennsylvania (the "County") following an incident that involved the name and Social Security number and health insurance information of one (1) Maryland resident. The County will provide written notice to the impacted individual later today, via U.S. Mail. The notice letter includes general advice on how to protect one's identity and obtain free credit reports and security freezes, as well as instructions for enrolling in a one-year, complimentary membership with Experian for credit monitoring and identity theft services. A copy of the notice letter is enclosed and additional details on the incident are below.

On January 24, 2024, the County responded to a ransomware attack on its computer network. The County immediately began working with a nationally recognized digital forensics team to secure the network and investigate the scope of the incident and alerted federal law enforcement. Through the investigation of this incident, the County learned that prior to the discovery of the attack, the cyber criminals took data from its network. On March 5, 2024, the County determined that the data stolen from the network contained personally identifiable information. Once it learned this, the County began a thorough review of the contents of the identified data to establish what information may have been involved, who may have been affected, and where those people reside so that it could provide notice. Although the review is ongoing, on March 12, 2024, the County learned that personal information belonging to a Maryland resident was involved in this incident. Notice will be provided to that individual later today.

Because cyber threats are always evolving, the County is continuously working to identify and mitigate threats and evaluate its IT security protocols to protect sensitive data. To further enhance its security and to help prevent similar occurrences in the future, the County has taken or will be taking the following steps:

1. Reviewed and updated firewall rules;
2. Deployed an endpoint detection and response solution across its full network;
3. Reviewed and closed unnecessary remote access routes;
4. Changed all passwords; and
5. Enrolled all users in multi-factor authentication.

Additionally, the County's investigators have not found any indication that data impacted by this incident has been released or offered for sale on the Dark Web. The County will also be providing notice of this incident to all appropriate state regulators.

NOTICE OF DATA SECURITY INCIDENT

Dear Sample A. Sample:

Washington County, Pennsylvania (the “County”) is writing to inform you of a recent cyber incident involving personal information we maintain about our current and former employees and their family members. We take this matter very seriously because we are committed to the privacy and security of all information in our possession. Therefore, we are providing this notice to inform you of the incident, offer complimentary identity monitoring services, and suggest ways that you can protect your information.

What Happened

On January 24, 2024, the County responded to a ransomware attack on our computer network. We immediately began an investigation, with the assistance of a nationally recognized digital forensics firm to understand what happened, contain the attack, restore operations and determine the nature and scope of what happened. We also notified federal law enforcement. Through our investigation, we determined that, prior to the County’s discovery of the attack, the cyber criminals took data from our network. We immediately began a thorough review of the identified data to determine what information was involved and who may have been affected so that we could provide notice to those individuals. We recently determined that some of your personal information was included in the data taken from the County’s network.

What Information Was Involved

The impacted data contained your name, Social Security number, health insurance carrier, and health insurance group number.

What We Are Doing About It

As soon as we learned about this incident, we immediately worked with our team to secure our network and begin an investigation. We have notified the Washington County District Attorney and continue to cooperate with federal law enforcement’s investigation. Washington County took steps to prevent County data from being published on the Dark Web and our investigators have not found any indication that data impacted by this incident has been released or offered for sale on the Dark Web. To further enhance our security and to help prevent similar occurrences in the future, we have taken or will be taking the following steps:

1. Reviewed and updated firewall rules;
2. Deployed an endpoint detection and response solution across our full network;
3. Reviewed and closed unnecessary remote access routes;
4. Changed all passwords; and
5. Enrolled all users in multi-factor authentication.

Additionally, the County will be providing notice of this incident to all appropriate state regulators.

What You Can Do

We recommend that you take the following preventative measures to help detect and mitigate any misuse of your information:

1. Enroll in a complimentary, one-year membership with Experian. This membership will provide you with identity monitoring services, including a copy of your credit report at signup; credit monitoring; identity restoration; Experian IdentityWorks ExtendCARE; and up to \$1 million in identity theft insurance. Instructions on how to activate your membership are included at the end of this letter.
2. Remain vigilant for incidents of fraud and identity theft by regularly reviewing your account statements and free credit reports for any unauthorized or suspicious activity. Information on additional ways to protect your information, including how to obtain a free credit report and free security freeze, can be found at the end of this letter.
3. Report any incidents of suspected identity theft to your local law enforcement, state Attorney General and the major credit bureaus.

Obtain Your Credit Report

You should also monitor your credit reports. You may periodically obtain your credit reports from each of the national consumer reporting agencies. In addition, under federal law, you are entitled to one free copy of your credit report every 12 months from each of the three nationwide consumer reporting agencies listed above. You may obtain a free copy of your credit report by going to www.AnnualCreditReport.com or by calling (877) 322-8228. You also may complete the Annual Credit Report Request Form available from the FTC at <https://www.consumer.ftc.gov/sites/www.consumer.ftc.gov/files/articles/pdf/pdf-0093-annual-report-request-form.pdf> and mail it to Annual Credit Report Request Service, P.O. Box 105281, Atlanta, GA 30348-5281. You may also contact any of the three major consumer reporting agencies to request a copy of your credit report. You may be able to obtain one or more (depending on the state) additional copies of your credit report, free of charge. You must contact each of the credit reporting agencies directly.

If you discover inaccurate information or a fraudulent transaction on your credit report, you have the right to request that the consumer reporting agency delete that information from your credit report file.

Fraud Alerts

You may want to consider placing a fraud alert on your credit report. An initial fraud alert is free and will stay on your credit file for one year. The alert informs creditors of possible fraudulent activity within your report and requests that the creditor contact you prior to establishing any new accounts in your name. To place a fraud alert on your credit report, contact any of the three national credit reporting agencies using the contact information listed above. As soon as one credit bureau confirms the fraud alert, they will notify the others. Additional information is available at www.annualcreditreport.com.

Security Freeze

You have the ability to place a security freeze on your credit report at no cost to you. A security freeze is intended to prevent credit, loans and services from being approved in your name without your consent. To place a security freeze on your credit report, you may be able to use an online process, an automated telephone line, or a written request to all three of the credit reporting agencies listed above. The following information must be included when requesting a security freeze (note that if you are requesting a credit report for your spouse, this information must be provided for him/her as well): (1) full name, with middle initial and any suffixes; (2) Social Security number; (3) date of birth; (4) current address and any previous addresses for the past five years; (5) a legible copy of a government-issued identification card, (6) proof of current address, such as a legible copy of a recent utility bill or bank or insurance statement, (7) a legible copy of a recent W-2, pay stub, or Social Security card, and (8) if you are a victim of identity theft, a copy of either the police report, investigative report, or complaint to a law enforcement agency concerning



identity theft. It is essential that each copy be legible, display your name and current mailing address, and the date of issue. **Under federal law, you cannot be charged to place, lift, or remove a security freeze.**

After receiving your freeze request, each credit reporting company will send you a confirmation letter containing a unique PIN (personal identification number) or password. Keep the PIN or password in a safe place, you will need it if you choose to lift the freeze. If you do place a security freeze *prior* to enrolling in the credit monitoring service as described above, you will need to remove the freeze in order to sign up for the credit monitoring service. After you sign up for the credit monitoring service, you may refreeze your credit file.

Additional Helpful Information

Even if you do not find any suspicious activity on your initial credit reports, the Federal Trade Commission (FTC) recommends that you check your credit reports periodically. Checking your credit report periodically can help you spot problems and address them quickly.

If you find suspicious activity on your credit reports or have reason to believe your information is being misused, call your local law enforcement agency and file a police report. Be sure to obtain a copy of the police report, as many creditors will want the information it contains to absolve you of the fraudulent debts. You may also file a complaint with the FTC by contacting them at the information provided above. This notice was not delayed as a result of a law enforcement investigation.

If your personal information has been used to file a false tax return, to open an account or to attempt to open an account in your name, or to commit fraud or other crimes against you, you may file a police report in the city in which you currently reside.
