Re: Notice of Data Event

To Whom It May Concern:

We represent Eichelberger Construction, Inc. ("ECI") located at 124 W Church St, Dillsburg, PA 17019, and are writing to notify your office of an incident that may affect the security of certain personal information relating to seven (7) Maryland residents. By providing this notice, ECI does not waive any rights or defenses regarding the applicability of Maryland law, the applicability of the Maryland data event notification statute, or personal jurisdiction.

Nature of the Data Event

On or about September 15, 2024 ECI discovered suspicious activity on its computer systems that included the encryption of certain systems. ECI promptly launched an investigation into the nature and scope of the activity. The investigation determined that between August 23, 2024 and September 15, 2024, an unknown, unauthorized actor gained access to certain computer systems and potentially accessed and/or acquired files stored on those computer systems.

Following this determination, ECI undertook a thorough review of the relevant files to identify individuals with personal information in the files. The review process recently concluded.

The information that could have been subject to unauthorized access includes name, Social Security number, driver's license number, and/or financial account information.

Notice to Maryland Residents

On or about November 27, 2024, ECI provided written notice of this incident to seven (7) Maryland residents. Written notice is being provided in substantially the same form as the letter attached here as ***Exhibit A***.

Other Steps Taken and To Be Taken

Upon discovering the event, ECI moved quickly to investigate and respond to the incident, assess the security of ECI systems, and identify potentially affected individuals. Further, ECI notified federal law enforcement regarding the event. ECI is also working to implement additional safeguards and training to its employees. ECI is providing access to credit monitoring services for twelve (12) months, through Experian, to individuals whose personal information was potentially affected by this incident, at no cost to these individuals.

Additionally, ECI is providing impacted individuals with guidance on how to better protect against identity theft and fraud, including advising individuals to report any suspected incidents of identity theft or fraud to their credit card company and/or bank. ECI is providing individuals with information on how to place a fraud alert and security freeze on one's credit file, the contact details for the national consumer reporting agencies, information on how to obtain a free credit report, a reminder to remain vigilant for incidents of fraud and identity theft by reviewing account statements and monitoring free credit reports, and encouragement to contact the Federal Trade Commission, their state Attorney General, and law enforcement to report attempted or actual identity theft and fraud.

Dear Sample A. Sample:

Eichelberger Construction, Inc. (“ECI”) writes to inform you of a recent incident that may involve some of your information. While we have no evidence of actual or attempted misuse of any information in connection with this incident, this notice provides information about the incident, our response, what you can do to protect your information from possible misuse, and contact procedures for you to ask questions or obtain additional information about this incident.

What Happened? On or about September 15, 2024 ECI discovered suspicious activity on its computer systems that included the encryption of certain systems. ECI promptly launched an investigation into the nature and scope of the activity. Our investigation determined that between August 23, 2024 and September 15, 2024, an unknown, unauthorized actor gained access to certain computer systems and potentially accessed and/or acquired files stored on those computer systems.

Following this determination, ECI undertook a thorough review of the relevant files to identify individuals with personal information in the files. The review process concluded on or around October 28, 2024. Upon completion of this process ECI took steps to notify the identified individuals.

What Information Was Involved? The following information related to you may have been impacted: your name, Social Security number, driver’s license number, and/or financial account information.

What We Are Doing. Upon discovering this incident, we quickly took steps to respond which included reviewing and enhancing our existing policies and procedures related to network security. ECI also reported this incident to federal law enforcement and will be notifying individuals and regulators as required. Moreover, as an added precaution, ECI is offering affected individuals access to ## months of complimentary credit monitoring. Instructions on how to enroll in these services can be found below.

What You Can Do. As a best practice, we encourage you to remain vigilant against incidents of identity theft and fraud by reviewing your account statements and monitoring your free credit reports for suspicious activity. You may also review the information and resources, including how to enroll in complimentary credit monitoring, in the below “Steps You Can Take to Protect Personal Information.”

Monitor Your Accounts

Under U.S. law, a consumer is entitled to one free credit report annually from each of the three major credit reporting bureaus, Equifax, Experian, and TransUnion. To order a free credit report, visit www.annualcreditreport.com or call, toll-free, 1-877-322-8228. Consumers may also directly contact the three major credit reporting bureaus listed below to request a free copy of their credit report.

Consumers have the right to place an initial or extended “fraud alert” on a credit file at no cost. An initial fraud alert is a 1-year alert that is placed on a consumer’s credit file. Upon seeing a fraud alert display on a consumer’s credit file, a business is required to take steps to verify the consumer’s identity before extending new credit. If consumers are the victim of identity theft, they are entitled to an extended fraud alert, which is a fraud alert lasting seven years. Should consumers wish to place a fraud alert, please contact any of the three major credit reporting bureaus listed below.

As an alternative to a fraud alert, consumers have the right to place a “credit freeze” on a credit report, which will prohibit a credit bureau from releasing information in the credit report without the consumer’s express authorization. The credit freeze is designed to prevent credit, loans, and services from being approved in a consumer’s name without consent. However, consumers should be aware that using a credit freeze to take control over who gets access to the personal and financial information in their credit report may delay, interfere with, or prohibit the timely approval of any subsequent request or application they make regarding a new loan, credit, mortgage, or any other account involving the extension of credit. Pursuant to federal law, consumers cannot be charged to place or lift a credit freeze on their credit report. To request a credit freeze, individuals may need to provide some or all of the following information:

1. Full name (including middle initial as well as Jr., Sr., II, III, etc.);
2. Social Security number;
3. Date of birth;
4. Addresses for the prior two to five years;
5. Proof of current address, such as a current utility bill or telephone bill;
6. A legible photocopy of a government-issued identification card (state driver’s license or ID card, etc.); and
7. A copy of either the police report, investigative report, or complaint to a law enforcement agency concerning identity theft if they are a victim of identity theft.

Additional Information

Consumers may further educate themselves regarding identity theft, fraud alerts, credit freezes, and the steps they can take to protect your personal information by contacting the consumer reporting bureaus, the Federal Trade Commission, or their state Attorney General. The Federal Trade Commission may be reached at: 600 Pennsylvania Avenue NW, Washington, D.C. 20580; www.identitytheft.gov; 1-877-ID-THEFT (1-877-438-4338); and TTY: 1-866-653-4261. The Federal Trade Commission also encourages those who discover that their information has been misused to file a complaint with them. Consumers have the right to file a police report if they ever experience identity theft or fraud. Please note that in order to file a report with law enforcement for identity

theft, consumers will likely need to provide some proof that they have been a victim. Instances of known or suspected identity theft should also be reported to law enforcement and the relevant state Attorney General. This notice has not been delayed by law enforcement.

For New Mexico residents, consumers have rights pursuant to the Fair Credit Reporting Act, such as the right to be told if information in their credit file has been used against them, the right to know what is in their credit file, the right to ask for their credit score, and the right to dispute incomplete or inaccurate information. Further, pursuant to the Fair Credit Reporting Act, the consumer reporting bureaus must correct or delete inaccurate, incomplete, or unverifiable information; consumer reporting agencies may not report outdated negative information; access to consumers' files is limited; consumers must give consent for credit reports to be provided to employers; consumers may limit "prescreened" offers of credit and insurance based on information in their credit report; and consumers may seek damages from violators. Consumers may have additional rights under the Fair Credit Reporting Act not summarized here. Identity theft victims and active-duty military personnel have specific additional rights pursuant to the Fair Credit Reporting Act.
