Re: Notice of Data Security Incident

To Whom It May Concern:

Constangy, Brooks, Smith & Prophete, LLP represents The City of Roseburg (“the City”), a municipality located in Roseburg, Oregon, in connection with a data security incident described in greater detail below. The purpose of this letter is to notify you of the incident.

1. What Happened

On or about August 4, 2024, the City experienced a network disruption and immediately initiated an investigation of the matter. The City engaged independent cybersecurity experts to assist with the process. As a result of the investigation, the City determined that certain files may have been acquired without authorization on August 4, 2024. The City undertook a comprehensive review of those files and learned on January 6, 2025, that personal information was contained within the potentially affected data. Please note that the City has no evidence of the misuse, or attempted misuse, of any potentially impacted information.

2. Number of Maryland Residents Notified and Type of Information

On February 14, 2025, the City began notifying two Maryland residents of this data security incident via U.S. First-Class Mail. The data sets affected by this incident varied by individual but included individuals’ names, Social Security numbers, and driver’s license numbers. A sample copy of the notification letter sent to potentially impacted individuals known at this time is included with this correspondence.

3. Steps Taken Relating to the Incident

The City has implemented additional security measures to prevent a similar incident from occurring in the future. Further, as referenced in the sample consumer notification letter, the City has offered notified individuals 12 months of complimentary services through IDX, which includes credit monitoring, dark web monitoring, a \$1 million identity fraud loss reimbursement policy, and fully managed identity theft recovery services.

I am writing to inform you of a recent data security incident that may have affected your personal information. The City of Roseburg ("the City" or "we") takes the privacy and security of all information within its possession very seriously. Please read this letter carefully as it contains information regarding the incident and steps that you can take to help protect your personal information.

What Happened. On or about August 4, 2024, we experienced a network disruption and immediately initiated an investigation of the matter. We engaged independent cybersecurity experts to assist with the process. As a result of the investigation, we determined that certain files may have been acquired without authorization on August 4, 2024. We undertook a comprehensive review of those files and learned on January 6, 2025, that some of your personal information was contained within the potentially affected data which is the reason for this notification. Please note that we have no evidence of the misuse, or attempted misuse, of any potentially impacted information.

What Information Was Involved. The information may have included your name and <<Variable Text 1: Impacted Data Elements>>.

What We Are Doing. As soon as we discovered this incident, we immediately removed and isolated the affected systems from the City's network, engaged the cybersecurity experts, and launched an investigation as mentioned above. We are also offering you complimentary identity protection services through IDX, a leader in consumer identity protection. IDX identity protection services include: <<Membership Offering Length: 12 months/24 months>> of credit and CyberScan monitoring, a \$1,000,000 insurance reimbursement policy, and fully managed id theft recovery services. The deadline to enroll in these services is May 14, 2025.

Steps You Can Take to Help Protect Your Personal Information

Review Your Account Statements and Notify Law Enforcement of Suspicious Activity: As a precautionary measure, we recommend that you remain vigilant by reviewing your account statements and credit reports closely. If you detect any suspicious activity on an account, you should promptly notify the financial institution or company with which the account is maintained. You also should promptly report any fraudulent activity or any suspected incidence of identity theft to proper law enforcement authorities, your state attorney general, and/or the Federal Trade Commission (the "FTC").

Copy of Credit Report: You may obtain a free copy of your credit report from each of the three major credit reporting agencies once every 12 months by visiting www.annualcreditreport.com, calling toll-free 1-877-322-8228, or by completing an Annual Credit Report Request Form and mailing it to Annual Credit Report Request Service, P.O. Box 105281, Atlanta, GA 30348. You also can contact one of the following three national credit reporting agencies:

Fraud Alert: You may want to consider placing a fraud alert on your credit report. An initial fraud alert is free and will stay on your credit file for at least one year. The alert informs creditors of possible fraudulent activity within your report and requests that the creditor contact you prior to establishing any accounts in your name. To place a fraud alert on your credit report, contact any of the three credit reporting agencies identified above. Additional information is available at www.annualcreditreport.com.

Security Freeze: You have the right to put a security freeze on your credit file for up to one year at no cost. This will prevent new credit from being opened in your name without the use of a PIN number that is issued to you when you initiate the freeze. A security freeze is designed to prevent potential creditors from accessing your credit report without your consent. As a result, using a security freeze may interfere with or delay your ability to obtain credit. You must separately place a security freeze on your credit file with each credit reporting agency. In order to place a security freeze, you may be required to provide the consumer reporting agency with information that identifies you including your full name, Social Security number, date of birth, current and previous addresses, a copy of your state-issued identification card, and a recent utility bill, bank statement or insurance statement.

Additional Free Resources: You can obtain information from the consumer reporting agencies, the FTC, or from your respective state Attorney General about fraud alerts, security freezes, and steps you can take toward preventing identity theft. You may report suspected identity theft to local law enforcement, including to the FTC or to the Attorney General in your state.
